Transitional Justice in film, lectures, and debate

Transitional Justice has many different faces. History has seen (inter)national tribunals, truth and reconciliation committees and local coping mechanisms. How does a state that survived mass violence and mass killings build a new future, and what mechanisms does it use for coming to terms with its past? This annual series – organized by the NIOD Institute for War, Holocaust and Genocide Studies and various partners – discusses roads to justice around the globe.

The guest speaker is **Scott Straus** - an expert on genocide in Rwanda and author, among others works, of the book *The Order of Genocide: Race, Power, and War in Rwanda*. He will give a lecture with the theme '20 Years after the Genocide in Rwanda, where do we stand?'. The Rwandan scholar **Felix Ndahinda** from Tilburg University will reflect on Straus' lecture.

The gathering will commence with the premiere of the first episode of the project *Love Radio*.

Love Radio is a transmedia experience by journalist and filmmaker **Eefje Blankevoort** and photographer **Anoek Steketee** about the complex process of reconciliation following an armed conflict, which is based on the popular Rwandan radio soap opera *Musekweya (New Dawn)*. This radio soap opera is developed by the Dutch NGO *Radio La Benevolencija*.
